Feedback Obtained

Feedback from students, teachers, parents and industry is taken into account while implementing the curriculum. Feedback is obtained through both formal and informal means such as suggestion boxes, feedback forms, interaction with mentors, Students' Council Meetings, Parents-Teachers' Meetings, interaction with the industry etc. After receiving feedback from all the concerned stakeholders, the mechanism of curriculum delivery is customized to cater to the students' capacity and industry-requirement. The employers give the information about the skills' gap observed among the students. Accordingly, bridge courses, enrichment programs are arranged to supplement the curriculum. Similarly, skill development programs and hands-on training is imparted. The teaching methodology includes experiential modes and game-based modules to effectively deliver the content. In some cases, guest lectures by experts are arranged as well.
